

Terry A. Messmer is a Professor and Extension Wildlife Specialist in the Department Wildland Resources, Utah State University (USU). Logan. He also is the Associate Director of the Jack H. Berryman Institute and holds the Quinney Professorship of Wildlife Conflict Management in the College of Natural Resources at Utah State University. He received B.S. degrees in Fisheries and Wildlife Management and in Biology from the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks; M.S. degrees in Natural Resource Management/Botany and in Regional and Community Planning; and a Ph.D. in Animal



and Range Sciences from North Dakota State University, Fargo. His research, teaching, and extension activities include identification, implementation, and evaluation of conservation strategies, technologies, and partnerships that can benefit agriculture, wildlife, and resource users. He is particularly interested in the reevaluation of contemporary fisheries and wildlife management policies and paradigms regarding the contributions private lands to natural resource conservation, wildlife and livestock interactions, and the abatement of wildlife/transportation system conflicts. In 2007 he was awarded the E.G. Peterson Extension Award, USU Extension's Highest Award in recognition of his service to the citizens of Utah. In 2008 he was awarded USU's Outstanding Graduate Mentor Award by the USU Graduate School. He is a member of the Society for Range Management and The Wildlife Society, past President of the North Dakota Chapter, Utah Chapter, and Central, Plains, Mountain Section of The Wildlife Society (TWS), a member of the TWS Wildlife Damage Management Working Group and currently chairperson of the Public Conservation Education and Extension Working Group. He is the past Editor-in-Chief of The Wildlife Society Bulletin and an Associate Editor for the Journal of Wildlife Management. He also is the past commander of the 200th Medical Detachment a U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) Preventive Medicine unit that was mobilized and deployed to support Operation Iraqi Freedom One. He currently is a Lieutenant Colonel in the USAR and serves as the commander of the 172d Medical Battalion (Logistics).
